Question:

Question:

Antifa is an organization that shamelessly endorses the use of violence for political purposes. Undoubtedly, the victimization of innocents for political ends deserves condemnation. Was Trump correct to condemn them in the context of Charlottesville?

Question:

Is the use of violence ever justified to make a political point, however noble and admirable as in the case of civil rights? In what cases should violence be condoned or advocated, if at all?

This is a dated question that was especially relevant in the times of the civil rights era. Here's an excerpt from Malcolm X, who was often at odds with MLK for advocating violence to achieve political ends.

"The question tonight, as I understand it, is "The Negro Revolt, and Where Do We Go From Here?" or What Next?" In my little humble way of understanding it, it points toward either the ballot or the bullet... I myself am a minister, not a Christian minister, but a Muslim minister; and I believe in action on all fronts by whatever means necessary... We want freedom now, but we're not going to get it saying "We Shall Overcome." We've got to fight until we overcome."
